

## From our Mission Director

Easter is the celebration of Christ's resurrection from the dead. It is celebrated on Sunday, and marks the end of Holy Week, the end of Lent, the last day of the Easter Triduum (Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Sunday), and is the beginning of the Easter season of the liturgical year.

As we know from the Gospels, Jesus Christ rose from the dead on the third day following his crucifixion, which would be Sunday. His resurrection marks the triumph of good over evil, sin and death. It is the singular event which proves that those who trust in God and accept Christ will be raised from the dead. Since Easter represents the fulfillment of God's promises to mankind, it is the most important holiday on the Christian calendar.

One week from Easter we celebrate the Divine Mercy Sunday that points us to the merciful love of God that lies behind the whole Paschal Mystery — the whole mystery of the death, burial and resurrection of Christ — made present for us in the Eucharist. In this way, it also sums up the whole Easter Octave. As Pope John Paul II pointed out in his *Regina Caeli* address on Divine Mercy Sunday, 1995: "the whole Octave of Easter is like a single day," and Octave Sunday is meant to be the day of "thanksgiving for the goodness God has shown to man in the whole Easter mystery."

To all our parishioners and guests - Have a Blessed Easter!

### The Gift of Easter

All changes on Easter morning. Mary of Magdala goes to the tomb to anoint Jesus' body, a ritual that could not be done until after the Sabbath. Discovering the stone removed, she runs to find the disciples. Peter returns to the tomb and enters to find the burial cloths pushed aside and the face cloth rolled up separately, clearly an indication that Jesus had no intention of returning to the tomb. Upon viewing the interior of the tomb, the beloved disciple "saw and believed," the Gospel tells us. Death that once created a chasm between humanity and God has no more power.



A tomb is associated with physical death. But other kinds of tombs exist; these can hold people in fear, anger, and loneliness. The gift of the resurrection is new life. This new life shatters the darkness of this world and offers us the chance to leave behind our "tombs." What better gift could Jesus give us? The promise celebrated at Easter is one that brings us to rejoice, trusting that God is with us. This promise makes all the difference. As the reading from Colossians states, "When Christ your life appears, then you too will appear with him in glory."

## Why Prayer?

Prayer is the "raising of the mind and the heart to God!"

There are so many forms of prayer: silence, singing, dancing, meditation, communal, formal (the Rosary or the Mass), and the informal, spontaneous cries of the heart. But why should we pray?

## Why Pray at All?

Prayer is much more than just "asking for something" from God.

Prayer is "the living relationship of the children of God with their Father who is good beyond all measure" (CCC 2565). Without prayer, we wither, like a tree that can only survive so long without water to nourish its roots. *God calls us first*; God is already thirsting for us to know and live in him! Prayer is the response to this love.

## How Should I Pray?

Start small! Commit to 10 minutes of silence, or one decade of the Rosary, or sit with the Scripture and pray, "Come, Holy Spirit."



### **Easter: Our Homecoming**

It is quite remarkable that none of the stories of the resurrection of Jesus actually recount His coming out of the tomb and how he was raised by God from the dead. But, we do have stories about what happened to His disciples. Easter created in them a sense of belonging and the awareness that instead of living for themselves, they were being called to a mission that would be nothing less than changing the course of history. This is a story we need in our time. Today, many people question the meaning and purpose of life and their identity as human beings. They live with the feeling of alienation, being disconnected from others, a community or past traditions. They feel abandoned in a world of hostile challenges and aimless pursuits.

Easter offers an antidote to these feelings of malaise. It provides a resounding answer to the questions about our meaning and purpose in life by drawing us out of our isolation and inviting us to live within the story of God's love for us – a love that knows no bounds. The message of Easter is simply this: Even though we killed the Son of God, God has not abandoned us. On the contrary. God raised Jesus so that He could come back from the dead to be with us, reminding us that we too are God's sons and daughters. God never abandons us and we should never abandon one another. Easter is our coming home to be God's family.

As we celebrate Christ coming back from the dead to be with us, there is a special joy in being able to return to our parish communities this year after two years of separation due to the pandemic. I urge you to experience that joy. It is the joy the first disciples experienced in being reunited with each other after being scattered in fear and division with the death of Jesus. It was a homecoming in which Christ, who first brought them together along the shores of Galilee, was now calling them to be with Him and with each other in a new way.

I invite you to look upon this Easter as new homecoming after being separated by the pandemic. This Easter, discover once again the presence of Christ as your parish community gathers for the Eucharist. Let Easter be a new opportunity to share with your fellow parishioners the experience of having a common purpose, identity and call to leave behind fear and death and make a difference in the world. Take up with fresh energy the task of making disciples, building community and inspiring witness through service in a Church that acts as a field hospital in a suffering world. We need to come together to encounter Christ anew and to rediscover who we are as an Easter People who make a difference in the world. It is in making a difference in the world that we find the answers to the questions about the meaning and purpose of life and our identity. And we do this together, as the disciples of Christ who are raised from the death of fear and isolation to live in relationship with each other, in community. Our parishes depend on each of us to make the personal commitment to form that community of disciples that acts as field hospital for one another and the world. So, as I urge you to return to your parish for inperson worship beginning this Easter, think of it as a homecoming, in which we gather to celebrate Christ rising from the dead because we too have risen from the dead. Happy Easter.

## Divine Mercy Sunday

On the Second Sunday of Easter is Divine Mercy Sunday, which is always observed on the first Sunday after Easter. This day commemorates the Divine Mercy of Jesus, and was particularly promoted by St. John Paul II when he was Pope. St. Faustina Kowalska, a Polish nun who died in 1938 and was canonized in 2000, had visions of Jesus promising his Divine Mercy to those who go to confession (before or after the feast day) and Communion on Divine Mercy Sunday. We invite you to pray the Divine Mercy chaplet as part of this observance.



You might have noticed the image of Divine Mercy in church today, which was painted in 1934 under the direction of St. Faustina and is displayed and venerated on this day. It is our hope that you will recognize in these stories your own call to trust Jesus, to accept his mercy, and to become an instrument of his mercy by extending love and forgiveness to others.

### Chaplet of Divine Mercy

#### Opening Prayer

You expired, Jesus, but the source of life gushed forth for souls, and the ocean of mercy opened up for the whole world. O Fount of Life, unfathomable Divine Mercy, envelop the whole world and empty Yourself out upon us.

(Repeat 3 times) O Blood and Water, which gushed forth from the Heart of Jesus as a font of Mercy for us, I trust in You!

#### Our Father

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

#### Hail Mary

Hail Mary, Full of Grace, The Lord is with thee. Blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus. Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners now, and at the hour of our death.

#### Apostle's Creed

I believe in God, the Father Almighty, Creator of Heaven and earth; and in Jesus Christ, His only Son Our Lord, Who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended into Hell; on the third day He rose again from the dead; He ascended into Heaven, and is seated at the right hand of God, the Father almighty; from there He will come to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy Catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body and life everlasting. Amen

### The Journey Continues.....

Students in Our Lady of Hope's religious education program continue to prepare to receive their First Reconciliation and their First Holy Communion.

During a special retreat on Saturday, April 23 the students will receive their First Reconciliation preparing their heart for the coming of Jesus for the first time on April 30th. During the retreat they will complete Communion posters, receive their "Buddie" letters which they will share with others. They will also have the opportunity to identify them on the Archdiocesan Seminarian Poster. There will be a reenactment of the Last Supper, the occasion on which Jesus instituted the Eucharist. Finally, the children will practice lining up and receiving the Sacrament. First Holy Communion will be on Saturday, April 30th at a 10:30 am Mass.

During our regular religious education classes on Tuesday, April 5th students in Levels 3-8 participated in a brief Reconciliation Service and had the opportunity to go to Confession as a way of helping them to prepare for Easter and Jesus' Resurrection. There are many opportunities for instrumentalists to serve in Music Ministry from playing flute or violin at a typical Sunday Mass, or in an ensemble for special liturgies.


Playing an instrument at Mass requires that players have a strong sense of rhythm and intonation.

## Top Ten Reasons to Attend Mass

1. **God asks us to make one day holy. God asks us to set aside one day per week to refocus physically, mentally, and spiritually.** We live in a secular world. Going to Sunday Mass helps us to see everything from a different perspective. We begin to see in the depths of our being that God is in charge.

2. **Jesus gives us the gift of Himself.** When we go to Sunday Mass, we are doing what Jesus commanded His followers to do. It is a command of love, to love God and others and to be loved by God. Jesus is present and comes to us in the Word of God we hear proclaimed and in His Real Presence, in the Blessed Sacrament.

3. **We need to be part of a community.** When we come together at Sunday Mass to pray and worship God, we satisfy a deep need, human and spiritual, to be in communion with other people. The other parishioners — even if we don't know all of them — give us support, affirmation, and encouragement in our attempt to live the Gospel message. They help us to see that we are not alone in living our Catholic Faith.

4. **God has a special message for us.** When we listen to the readings, the homily, and the prayers of the Mass, God speaks to us in a special way. We should come away from each Sunday Mass with at least one new thought or inspiration that will have a positive impact in our lives.

5. **We need to talk to God.** When we go to Mass, we speak to God through our singing, our communal responses and prayers, and our personal prayers from the depths of our hearts. During Mass we have the opportunity to ask God for what we need, to promise God we will do what He wants us to do, and thank God for the many blessings He has bestowed on us.

6. **People need our prayers.** We can pray for other people anytime, but when we pray for others during Mass, we pray in a special way. It doesn't matter if the other people are separated from us by distance or by death.

7. **We need to stand up for what we believe.** Being a follower of Jesus is counter-cultural. At every Mass, we have the opportunity to stand up and proclaim what we believe publicly. We admit that we believe in one God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and in the teaching of the Catholic Church.

8. **We need to acknowledge that we make mistakes.** At every Mass, we have the opportunity to review the past week. We admit that we have sinned in thought, in word, in deed, in what we have done and what we have failed to do. With God's help, we resolve to change our lives.

9. **We need ritual in our lives.** Mass is offered as a Sacred Ritual. This means that through the familiar prayers, and movements, through the Divine Miracle of Transubstantiation, changing bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Jesus, we are formed, disciplined, and consoled. The "sameness" of the Mass supports and nourishes our spiritual journey every week.

10. **We need to experience something bigger than ourselves.** When we go to Mass, we share in the Suffering, Death and Resurrection of Jesus. When we offer our ordinary lives to God through Jesus, we enter into God's great plan for the world's salvation.

## We have low-gluten hosts available!

Persons with celiac disease or any sensitivity to wheat and if you would like to receive a low-gluten host at communion time, they are available here at OLH. (Church law does not allow 100% gluten-free bread for the Eucharist, but the gluten content in these hosts is low enough that you should not be bothered.). You will need to make arrangements with the presider or the greeter. We will place a low-gluten host in a separate pyx on the altar to be consecrated with the rest of the communion. Please call or email our office with any questions.

## Do you have difficulty walking to the front of the Church for Communion?

Please ask an usher to let the presider know where you are seated so the priest can bring Communion to you. Receiving the Body of Christ is too important to miss out. The ushers scan the congregation, so if you forget to let an usher know, put your hand up so they can see you. We want to accommodate you.
