

Reflections from Fr. Derek

The morning after the shooting in Highland Park, I watched a short video of someone filming the parade. The video captured laughing, music, and kids playing. Seconds later, people were running and taking cover. The minute-long video captured perfectly the transition from joyful celebration to fear and chaos. Parents shuttled their kids to safety in one hand while carrying an American flag in the other. Watching the real-time video of people marching by and then hearing the rapid-fire gunshots was hard to watch more than once. It was so tragic, so scary.

Many other feelings surface too. I hear sadness in parents who want to keep their children safe. I feel angry that our children are deprived of their innocence because of the destructive actions of very few. And I am sickened that we turn on each other looking to blame somebody—anybody. I ask myself, *What am I supposed to do? Such senseless violence, how can I help?* I wonder if people are asking "How could God let this happen?" and whether someone of faith is there to listen and encourage them. Such events can cause us to question God's goodness and feel that God could not be further away.

And yet, because of this tragedy, I believe that what is happening in me is not a diminishing of faith in God but a greater and deeper yearning for it. I want more peace. More harmony. More hope. More God. St. Paul says in his letter to the Philippians that in everything, we are to make our requests known to God. "**Then**, the peace of God that surpasses all understanding will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus" (Phil 4:6-7). In times of trial and anguish, confusion, and fear, God offers us a peace that is out of this world. That is what holy means in Hebrew... kadosh = holy, sacred, other worldly; set apart. Christians are meant to live in such a way where we bring faith, hope, love, peace, patience, joy, truth (attributes of God) into situations where those things are absent. We see God at work in the actions of law enforcement, the love of parents, the charity pouring in from outside communities, and the prayers of all faith traditions. God has chosen to use examples such as these to show us His compassionate face in very difficult times. God is here. Despite our doubts and questions, God has not left us.

Please reach out to those in need. Please help those on the margins of our society. Please do what you can to support those who are questioning God's goodness. Above all, don't stop praying to God who has not left, nor ever will leave, us. Do not forget God does not leave His disciples in the storm. Just the opposite. He saves them and He calms the storms.

Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. May their souls and the souls of all the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. Amen.

Why do we do that? Why do Catholics Baptize Babies?

For adults who want to be baptized, the celebration only takes place after a long, guided, and thoughtful process through the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults. This is also true for many Protestant Christians, who are baptized later in life, often after a personal, transforming religious experience. So, it seems fair to ask why our Catholic tradition includes infant baptism. After all, if we make adults who want to become Catholic wait months and even years as they grow in their understanding of Christ and his teachings, why should babies - who "do nothing" - be baptized?

Our custom of infant baptism dates back to the earliest days of the Church, when St. Paul baptized entire households, including, we presume, children (see Acts 16:15, 33; 18:8). That had become common practice by the second century. When Christianity was legalized 200 years later, infant baptism became the normal practice throughout the Church.

We recognize that in Baptism, we are given the grace to overcome original sin - the human tendency to choose ourselves and our own wills over God - and to become members of the Church. This is the gift we give to infants in Baptism.

In its essence, the baptism of infants also reminds us adult Christians that the gift of salvation and membership in the Church (i.e., the Body of Christ) is God's initiative. It is freely offered to us, regardless of where we might be in life's journey. Salvation isn't something we earn. Instead, we see that Baptism is the beginning of a lifelong process of growing into the kind of disciples that Jesus wants us to be.

Our Lady of Hope Catholic Mission Faith Formation Program

We here at Our Lady of Hope Catholic Mission continue to offer you and your family a Faith Formation (Religious Education) program that is more traditional. What does that mean? It means that Level 1 thru 8 classes will meet on the first three Tuesdays of the month from 6:30 – 8:00 PM September thru April. The Sacramental preparation class (Level 2 First Reconciliation/First Communion) will be supplemented with a class on the 2nd Sunday of each month September thru December for Reconciliation and January thru April for First Holy Communion. The Level 8 Confirmation classes will engage students in experiential activities which provide opportunities to practice their faith through service projects and teach them more about their faith than what they can learn from a book. Our Sunday Sacramental programs require that the parents accompany their children to the class sessions and work with them on assigned activities at home. Our Tuesday evening classes also require parents to work with their children at home by reviewing their lessons, praying with them, and helping them with projects related to their specific lessons.

It is extremely important for the growth of the Church that we continue to teach our Children about God, help them develop a deep personal relationship with Him, and expand their faith to include service to others as a family.



AND WHO IS MY **NEIGHBOR?**

LUKE 10:29

IN OUR HEARTS AND MINDS

Love God. Love neighbor. This is our call, the sum of all it means to live as Christ's holy people in the world. Moses told the people that the law—all that sums up this call to love God and neighbor-isn't far off, something distant and hard to reach. It is in our hearts and minds, on our lips. We have only to live what has been instilled in us through the grace of God and the power of the Holy Spirit, the fullness of God's love that dwells in us through Christ. We who are baptized into Christ's life rely on this presence as we extend ourselves in service as did the Samaritan who saw the need of the injured traveler and stopped everything to give comfort, care, and mercy. Such love of neighbor is an outpouring and sign of the love of Christ.

LOVE GOD

What does it mean to love God with all our heart, being, strength, and mind? We turn our hearts to God in prayer, quiet moments of reflection, and participation in the Mass and sacraments. Our whole being may turn to the Lord in trust in the midst of troubled times or when we need courage. We find strength to live as Christ's people, even when faced with the questions, doubts, and derision of others. We may turn to the Lord with our mind as we prayerfully read sacred scripture and learn more fully the teaching of the Church. All of these things point to a singular desire to know God deeply. The love we have for God is, after all, a reflection of the great love God has for each of us.

LOVE NEIGHBOR

Jesus' parable of the Good Samaritan points to the impact our love of God is to have in our lives. The priest and Levite were more concerned with observing the letter of the law rather than living its essence. The Samaritan found himself unable to pass by without coming to the traveler's aid. Who are the travelers whom we meet? What is our response? Are we so filled with the love of God that we cannot ignore the suffering of hunger or homelessness, the needs of the lonely and sick? Loving God necessitates loving our neighbor. We cannot have one without the other. Jesus shows us that the love

we are to share is selfless, sacrificial. The Samaritan not only cared for the traveler's wounds, but took him to find shelter and paid for his care. He went the extra mile on the journey of faith. Who is your neighbor today? How will you love him or her?



ATTENTIVE TO GOD'S PRESENCE

Summer is in full swing and tent camping is often a memory-making part of it—sometimes just because of the difficulties of putting up the tent! In today's first reading we see Abraham sitting at the entrance to his tent and welcoming three unexpected strangers. By the end of the story God's covenant with Abraham is renewed with the promise that Sarah will give birth to a son. Psalm 15 answers the question, "Lord, who may abide in your tent?" The answer leaves little doubt about what is required to live in the presence of the Lord. In his letter to the Colossians Paul confirms that "the mystery" that was hidden from past ages is now being revealed. The Gospel account of Martha and Mary's ways of welcoming Jesus again emphasizes the central truth that God's promise of salvation is real and present—if only we would listen.

CHOOSING THE BETTER PART?

Is it possible to listen to the Gospel story about Mary and Martha without immediately "hearing between the lines" as Martha mutters to herself, "Why do I have to do all the work around here?" Or without always feeling the sting of Jesus' gentle reprimand of Martha? Without slotting our friends into either the "Martha" or "Mary" column? Without quickly "translating" the story into a lesson about the value of listening over action? Interestingly, Mary never says a word in this story. All of the dialogue is between Jesus and Martha. The importance of first listening to Jesus is, without a doubt, essential to discipleship. We need to be deeply rooted in the Word of God if we want to spread the Good News and stand firm in time of trial or temptation. Yet what does that mean when guests need to be fed?

WHEN WORK BECOMES OUR PRAYER

We know that hospitality to strangers was a central value in the cultural world of Jesus. Abraham's welcome of the three strangers at his tent was expected protocol for the time. Sarah's meal-making for the unexpected guests is blessed with welcome news of a son—and the keeping of God's promise to Abraham. Immediately before the Mary and Martha story in the Gospel of Luke is the story of the Good Samaritan. That parable is unwavering about the importance of action—of going out of our way for others. In the Abraham and the Good Samaritan stories, action predominates. Yet in the next chapter of Luke when a woman in the crowd shouts out, "Blessed is the womb that carried you . . . ," Jesus responds, "Rather, blessed are those who hear

the word of God and observe it." Hymn-writer Herman Stuempfle expresses well the relationship between action and contemplation when he writes that we thank the Lord both for quiet time and for the Word that accompanies us in our work and helps make that work a prayer.

Statement of Cardinal Cupich on the July 4 mass shooting in Highland Park

I have been watching the news in horror as at least 6 are dead and many more were wounded after a gunman opened fire as families attended an Independence Day parade in Highland Park. What should have been a peaceful celebration of our nation's founding ended in unspeakable tragedy.

Please join me in praying for the victims and their loved ones, who never imagined a July 4 celebration could become a killing ground. Pray too for the safety of first responders as they pursue the person responsible for this tragedy. They bravely rushed into the danger to treat victims and to protect others from harm.

The parade reportedly had a heavy presence of police and fire vehicles, yet this shooter was able to wound at least two dozen people before he stopped, or was stopped, and fled. Victims ranged in age from 8 to 85. Weapons designed to rapidly destroy human bodies have no place in civil society.

It is barely July, and this year the United States is already experiencing more than one mass shooting a day. Chicago Police reported at least 55 shot and 7 killed since Friday, and the holiday weekend is not yet over. Gun violence is now the leading cause of death for U.S. children.

Whatever one makes of the right to bear arms, there is plenty of room for prudential judgment in interpreting the Second Amendment so as to enact serious, broadly popular gun-safety measures. The Senate finally passed a significant, yet modest, gun-safety bill last month. But clearly more must be done.

The right to bear arms does not eclipse the right to life, or the right of all Americans to go about their lives free of the fear that they might be shredded by bullets at any moment. Gun violence is a life issue. We must continue to pray that all our officials, elected and unelected alike, will redouble their commitment to keeping safe the people they have sworn to serve

Pope Francis wrote to the people of Chicagoland in 2016: "As Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. said, humanity 'must evolve for all human conflict a method which rejects revenge, aggression and retaliation. The foundation of such a method is love.' I urge all people, especially young men and women, to respond to Dr. King's prophetic words and know that a culture of nonviolence is not an unattainable dream, but a path that has produced decisive results."

May the Lord of mercy embrace in love those who have died, bring healing to the wounded, comfort to their loved ones, and courage to all of us, so that we may respond to this tragedy united as God's children to build a path to safety and peace.

Mission Cooperation Plan Collection - August 7, 2022 (All Masses)

As customary on the first weekend of August, our parish will be participating in the annual missionary cooperation plan. This year we have the opportunity to accept donations for San Ignacio de Loyola Parish of Salta, Argentina. A missionary representative will visit our church on August 7, to speak and appeal for contributions. If you would like to send a contribution to this mission, please place your check or cash in the Mission Appeal envelope or visit GiveCentral.org. Below is a brief summary of their mission. Thank you!

"San Ignacio de Loyola Parish" is located at the heart of Santa Victoria Este municipality, in the norteast of Rivadavia department, in Salta, Argentina. Over 70% of the people are natives and 90% of inhabitants have unsatisfied basic needs. This area reveals such a serious situation of poverty and social exclusion evidenced by the inhabitants' deterioration of living conditions, in both indigenous and rural populations.

At ecclesial level, San Ignacio de Loyola Parish does not have a stable priest living in the town. However, it is assisted by Franciscans friars living in Aguaray, another municipality. Currently, there is no established community or catechists. Even though, we have worked with former priests in evangelization and humanitarian aid, the lack of priests is an ongoing problem in the northern region of Chaco. Unfortunately, the lack of faith and the crisis of moral values are latent conflicts due to the lack of attention and evangelization.

At social-sanitary level, the Ministry of Health of the Government of Salta have reported 855 severe acute malnutrition cases in children under the age of five, and more than 10,000 cases of children at risk in the Chaco Salteño area, in which it was declared a social-sanitary emergency earlier this year. It also reported about 10,000 children with malnutrition risk under the age of five. The great majority of the rural communities are highly vulnerable.

Accepting Pope Francis invitation, we wish to reach everyone (EG 46-49). The Holy Spirit motivates us to open our hearts to the cries of today's humanity by living closer to the reality of native people, cultivating a communion outlook together with the different institutional local members, and turning the midst of the people into *Pastorcitas (calque: Little Shepherds)* who assume a missionary impulse, a challenge for a greater fruitfulness as Congregation. This project is carried out in close collaboration with the group of missionaries called *Kalayhis*, which is composed of marriages and young people.
