





Dear Friends,

As I mentioned in my homily last week, the focus of our readings during the final weeks of the liturgical year have to do with the *eschaton*, or the end times. This weekend is the 33rd Sunday of Ordinary Time and we basically have three weeks until Advent, the beginning of the church year. During this time, we are called to reflect on what the life beyond looks like and how we should prepare ourselves for it.

Every now and then we get a glimpse of our mortality and we realize how fast time goes by. We then realize we may not be what we once were. Our bodies age: hair grays and our mental capacity may have diminished.

I know an older priest who went to Dunkin' Donuts to get a sandwich and a cup of coffee. He placed his order at the drive thru and was told to come up to the window. He rolled down his window and the employee looked at him and said, "Oh! You get the senior citizen discount." He was a little bit stunned. The employee got his food and the priest asked him, "At what age does someone qualify to be a senior citizen?" He said, "I think it's 60." And the priest said, "But I'm only 59." The employee said, "No problem. Close enough."

I know there may be some out there who can relate to my priest friend. I can laugh a bit because it hasn't happened to me yet (But I'm catching up!). What does the inevitability of our mortality/the deterioration of the body stir in you? Fear? Uncertainty? Hope? Joy? All of the above? We come to church and we come to God for answers to these questions. These primordial feelings are great fodder for honest prayer. I imagine God longs to talk to you about it.

What must we do to hear God and have confidence that we belong to Him? We want to say yes to God and to His invitation for eternal life, but how do we do it? The second talk of our RENEWED parish mission is this upcoming Wednesday, 11/16 at 7:15 p.m. in the church. The topic is on how to say YES to God. We hope you say YES to showing up!

Dear Friends,

During the month of November, we remember and pray for those who have gone before us marked with the 'sign of faith' in a more intentional, more focused way. On November 1st, we remember all those marked as Saints, who lived and died in service of following Jesus, bringing the message of God, found in Jesus Christ, to the world of their day. We remember them for their courage, perseverance, and giving witness even unto death - should that be asked of them. We do not remember them because they were perfect, or because they never failed, or got it wrong. Some of our greatest saints, were the most rebellious. But God persisted in His calling them and eventually they gave God their 'yes.'

On November 2nd, The Feast of the Holy Souls, we remember all those whom we hold dear, who have died, marked with the sign of faith. Here at OLH we remember them in a special way in the Book of Life Mass which we celebrate on the first Sunday following All Souls Day. This past year we have walked with 33 families, who journeyed this road of transition, of a loved one into eternity. Some were founding members of this faith community, and some were young and taken sooner than we were ready. Let us commit to keeping them in our prayers during November and throughout the year.

Both Father Derek, and Father Joslyn reminded us in their homilies, the readings of November, call us to contemplate, and reflect, on what the next life, the life to come, looks like. These scripture readings remind us to examine, how we are living this gift of life. Are we living in such a way that we are preparing for this eternal life, while teaching our children, to do the same? We must live in such a way that tells the world that we are a people who live this life, with all its challenges, and joys, its struggles, and its triumphs, as those with a hope, confident in all that scripture promises. We *do* have a hope and His name is Jesus.

And in its wisdom our Church leads us from November to December, straight into Advent, and the long-foretold promise of Messiah, the One who would come into this world, and bring hope and salvation to all who would simply say 'yes' to following Him. So, as we conclude this liturgical year and begin a new one, let us commit to pursuing anew, the Source of our Hope.

Advent Preparations

In family life, we try to prepare ourselves for the future: our next vacation, our children's education, our retirement. We are careful not to allow ourselves to be caught by surprise so that we can handle any challenges our family may face. The Scripture readings we hear in church during Advent remind us that we are called to be attentive in our spiritual lives as well. We are to wait in hope so that the coming salvation will not catch us unprepared. This means attending to our family's spiritual life as carefully as we attend to other important family matters.

As you gather as a family, talk about a time when you received surprise visitors at your house, perhaps a neighbor stopping by or a relative who arrived unannounced. Was your household prepared to receive this surprise guest? What might your family have done differently if you knew ahead of time that this visitor was going to arrive?

Jesus told his disciples that no one but the Father knows when the Son of Man will come in glory. Read what Jesus told his disciples about this in **Mark 13:33–37**.

33 Be on guard! Be alert! You do not know when that time will come. 34 It' like a man going away: He leave his house and puts his servant in charge, each with their assigned task, and tells the one at the door to keep watch. 35 "Therefore keep watch because you do not know when the owner of the house will come back – whether in the evening, or at midnight, or when the rooster crows at dawn.
36 If he comes suddenly, do not let him find you sleeping.
37 What I say to you, I say to everyone: 'Watch!'

During Advent, we not only prepare ourselves to celebrate the birth of Jesus, but we also check in to see if we are doing all the things that will keep us ready to receive Jesus when he comes again. Talk to your family about how you are doing in attending to your spiritual life as a family. Recommit yourselves to praying daily, reading Scripture, and staying faithful to God's commandments. Pray together that through this Advent season your family will be more prepared to receive Jesus when he comes again. As a concluding prayer pray the Lord's Prayer.

Why a New Name?

As the youth of Our Lady of Hope Mission continue to prepare to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation on February 11, 2023 they have been asked to adopt a saint's name that they will carry with them throughout their life. On the day they receive the sacrament,



the bishop will confirm them using their chosen saint name.

What is the purpose of a Confirmation name? When students select a Confirmation name, the goal is to pick the name of a saint they admire, can relate to, or aspire to be like. They will be bonded to the saint spiritually and he/she will serve as their model in providing them guidance and protection. Throughout Biblical History we have numerous examples of God changing people's name to reflect their role in the history of the church. Abram became "Abraham" meaning "Father of a Nation". Simon's name was changed to "Peter" meaning "rock" and refers to Peter becoming the first pope: "And upon this rock I will build my church" (Matthew 16:17-18).

Since there are thousands of saints, how does one choose? Learn about the saints, their trials and tribulations, triumphs and faith and select one that you can relate to and be inspired by. Find a saint with similar goals and interests. . There is a saint for every virtue, sport, hobby, occupation that you could ever dream of housed at the Shrine of All Saints visited by the students giving them a large range of candidates to choose from. There is a saint for practically every cause and interest. We have, Francis – the animal lover; St. Cecilia – the musician ; St. Maximilian Kolbe – war veteran, Sebastian – warrior, etc. What virtues do they possess that you would like to express more in your life? Bravery, humility, courage, prayerfulness. That Saint will help you become the person you want to be and share his/her goodness with you.

Confirmation candidates for Our Lady of Hope and Mary Seat of Wisdom met at the Shrine of All Saints in Morton Grove on October 30th to listen to a detailed presentation by Father Dennis O'Neill rector of the Shrine and four docents who pointed out some of the over 3000 relics housed at the shrine and help them learn more about the saints and select one for their Confirmation name. Parents, students, and catechists attending this field trip found it to be both interesting and informational. The Shrine is open to the public if anyone is interested.


